
Private Garrett E. Moyer Gravestone Dedication Co. C, 6th Michigan Infantry Regiment

Joe Orbeck passed away July 27th at Stratford Pines Nursing Center in Midland. He was a member of Camp 20 from the 1990's until he moved to Midland in 2008. He was well loved by all who met and cared for him in his final years. Brother Joe is fondly remembered by the brothers of Camp 20 where he was the camp treasurer for many years. 
